MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR



Challenging and positive changes stimulated new vision, strengthened core values, and deepened partnerships for Fraser Valley Regional Library during 2009.

Fresh talent joined the Board in January with more than half of the appointed councillors being new to the FVRL Board. The strong relationships already established between the libraries, their local governments, and the communities they serve, were broadened even further as these new leaders brought their expertise to the Board table. Later in the year, Rob O'Brennan, a 21-year veteran of the organization, took the helm of FVRL as chief executive officer, bringing with him a skill set well suited to guiding the largest public library system in British Columbia.

In April, FVRL joined the "green movement" with the addition of two new diesel-electric hybrid delivery trucks to the fleet. MLAs and trucking industry leaders attended the launch of these trucks that were among the first 30 hybrid delivery trucks of their kind in the province. These trucks support the provincial government's carbon neutral objectives for BC and demonstrate FVRL's support for local governments committed to becoming carbon neutral by 2012. A much-appreciated grant from the Fraser Basin Council - Green Fleets BC program helped offset the additional cost of these hybrid trucks.

2009 was once again a year of economic downturn across the province - triggering rumours of significant reductions in provincial funding for public libraries. In light of these rumours, the FVRL Board, convinced that public libraries are high-yielding investments in communities, joined with other public libraries across BC proactively campaigning and engaging the public to urge the Province's ongoing funding of public libraries. Although library funding was reduced by about 78 per cent of previous years'

levels, we were pleased that the BC government recognized and acknowledged the integral role that public libraries play in community development and literacy. It is our hope to work in cooperation with government to restore and enhance funding to libraries as the provincial economic picture improves.

FVRL is successful and effective because of the passion of many people who recognize the true worth of public libraries. On behalf of the Board, I offer sincere thanks to the visionary donors who share their resources with us to enhance leisure, learning, and literacy in their communities. We applaud the efforts of our Friends of the Library, who give tirelessly of themselves so that others may be enriched. We extend our deep gratitude to our conscientious staff, whose steadfast dedication and service to their customers and communities have an invaluable, life-impacting influence.

The challenges and changes of 2009 confirmed the importance of FVRL to its customers as well as its significance to the communities it serves. As we move forward, we will continue to build upon the empowering vision, values, and partnerships that make us strong.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



The worldwide economic upheaval of 2009 had a noticeable impact upon Fraser Valley Regional Library as consumers needed help stretching their budgets...and we were ready.

Job seekers visited FVRL to search for jobs online while others rediscovered their library as the place for easy-on-the-pocket entertainment. Summer Reading Club and Reading Link Challenge became literacy-enriching attractions that drew more participants than ever before. More program initiatives enabled a host of new partnerships with schools and community agencies and included the implementation of Literacy Now action plans.

FVRL customers enjoyed the benefits of improved self check-out options and their free in-library Internet access was enhanced through increased bandwidth and wireless access in most locations. After remaining relatively unchanged for the past few years, circulation of library materials increased by a remarkable nine per cent in 2009 as more customers took advantage of all the free resources available at their local libraries.

Addressing the needs of customers with disabilities was another important focus of 2009. Outreach Services, a department that provides library service to print-impaired and homebound customers, responded to growing demand for its services by working with a consultant to develop strategies that will vastly expand its capacity over the next two years in order to meet the needs of its specialized customers.

Despite the economic pressures, particularly cordial negotiations were conducted in just five sessions to work out the terms and conditions of the 2009-2011 Collective Agreement. Representatives of the Canadian Union of Public Employees Local 1698, upon agreeing to the terms, stated that they did

so in recognition of the fact that FVRL was facing financial hardship. We sincerely appreciate the positive relationship between CUPE Local 1698 and FVRL as well as the team-spirited negotiations that led to this settlement.

The support and commitment of our Board members and employees have been foundational to the achievements of 2009 and I extend my sincere appreciation to each one for their part in fulfilling FVRL's mission - to connect people to the world of information and ideas. I look forward to the future, confident that FVRL will continue to be ready and will maximize the opportunity contained within each challenge.
